SYNAXARION: Holy Father Auxentius of the Mountain; Cyril, Equal-to-the-Apostles & Teacher of the Slavs; Nicholas the New Martyr of Corinth; Abraham, Bishop of Carrhes in Mesopotamia

Resurrectional Apolytikion (3rd Mode): Let all things above in heaven rejoice, and let all things below on earth be glad. With all the might and strength of His arm, an eternal deed the Lord did perform. Beneath His feet He has trampled down death by death, and first born of the dead has He become. From the womb of Hades has He delivered us, and to all the world has granted His great mercy.

For The Devout Man (1st Mode): As a citizen of the desert and an angel incarnate * and a wonder-worker you shone forth, O Afxentios, our God-bearing father. * Since you received the spiritual gifts * by fasting and vigilance and prayer, * you can cure those who are ailing and heal the souls * of those who run to you with faith. * Glory to Him who gave His might to you; * glory to Him who placed a crown on you; * glory to Him who operates through you, providing cures to all.

Apolytikion of St. John the Baptist: The memory of the just is observed with hymns of praise; for you O Forerunner the witness of the Lord is sufficient. You have proved to be truly more venerable than the prophets. Since you were granted to baptize in the river, the One Whom they proclaimed. Therefore, you strove for truth, proclaiming with joy the Good News, even to those in Hades: that God was manifested in the flesh, and takes away the sins of the world, and grants to us His great mercy.

Kontakion: A protection of Christians unshamable, intercessor to our Holy Maker unwavering, reject not, the prayerful cries of those who are in sin. Instead, come to us for you are good, your loving help bring unto us, who are crying in faith to you. Hasten to intercede and speed now to supplicate, as a protection for all time, Theotokos for those who honor you.

Brethren, you are the temple of the living God; as God said, "I will live in them and move among them, and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. Therefore come out from them, and be separate from them, says the Lord, and touch nothing unclean; then I will welcome you, and I will be a father to you, and you shall be my sons and daughters, says the Lord Almighty."

Since we have these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from every defilement of body and spirit, and make holiness perfect in the fear of God.

Gospel Reading is from Matthew 15:21-28

At that time, Jesus went to the district of Tyre and Sidon. And behold, a Canaanite woman from that region came out and cried, "Have mercy on me, O Lord, Son of David; my daughter is severely possessed by a demon." But he did not answer her a word. And his disciples came and begged him, saying, "Send her away, for she is crying after us." He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." And he answered, "It is not fair to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs." She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table." Then Jesus answered her, "O woman, great is your faith! Be it done for you as you desire." And her daughter was healed instantly.

Fifty-Two Verses in Fifty-Two Weeks: The Bible Project February 14-20

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

Matthew 5:8

A successful garden starts with good soil. In looking over the dirt in which we want to plant, we have to first remove the rocks. We begin with the largest rocks that are easy to see. Then we go over the dirt again with a more discerning eye, and remove the smaller stones. And then we go over the dirt yet again, removing even the smallest of rocks, so that we can have dirt that is smooth, unpolluted with rocks, and ready to receive whatever seeds we are going to plant. We then plant the seeds, water them in, keep them in the sunlight, and make sure there is fertilizer to help them grow. A pure heart works in much the same way. In order to see God, one needs a pure and clean heart. This starts by removing the things that are obvious that keep us from God. This includes habitual sins and other bad habits. Then we move to the smaller things, forming good habits, guarding our mouths, taking time to pray and worship. Then we move to even more special things, like charity and generosity. The journey to the pure heart starts with eliminating the bad, then embracing the good intrinsically and then moving away from ourselves to love and serve those around us. If we want to have a pure heart, so that we can see God, not only for ever-lasting life but in this life, then we need to remove our habitual sins and bad habits. Then we need to commit ourselves to the spiritual disciplines of prayer, fasting, Scripture reading and worship. And finally we need to commit ourselves to helping one another, serving one another. These habits will help us see God in this life and for eternal life.
