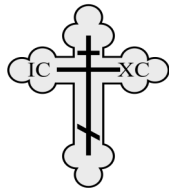

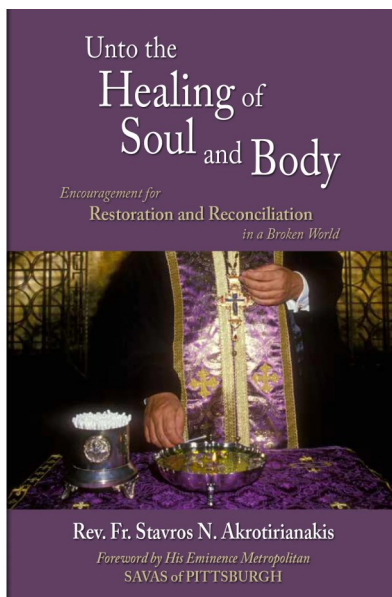

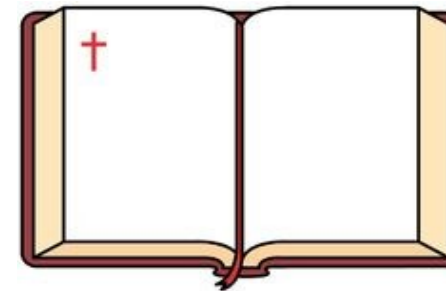


Readings for Sunday, June 11

Prokeimenon: God is wonderful among his saints. Psalm 67.35,26

The reading is from St. Paul's Letter to the Hebrews 11:33-40; 12:1-2

Brethren, all the saints through faith conquered kingdoms, enforced justice, received promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Some were tortured, refusing to accept release, that they might rise again to a better life. Others suffered mocking and scourging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in two, they were tempted, they were killed with the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, afflicted, ill-treated - of whom the world was not worthy - wandering over deserts and mountains and in dens and caves of the earth. And all these, though well attested by their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had foreseen something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect. Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith.

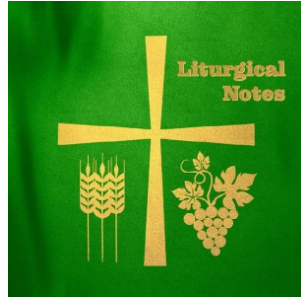


The reading is from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew 10:32-33; 37-38; 19:27-30

The Lord said to his disciples, "Every one who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven; but whoever denies me before men, I also will deny him before my Father who is in heaven. He who loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and he who loves son or

daughter more than me is not worthy of me; and he who does not take his cross and follow me is not worthy of me." Then Peter said in reply, "Lo, we have left everything and followed you. What then shall we have?" Jesus said to them, "Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of man shall sit on his glorious throne, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And every one who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for my name's sake, will receive a hundredfold, and inherit eternal life. But many that are first will be last, and the last first."

June 11-17

Enter by the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the way is easy, that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard, that leads to life, and those who find it are few. Matthew 7: 13-14

I once saw a funny meme that said “There’s a reason why they call it the “stairway to heaven” and the “highway to hell.” Many people think just the opposite. We think there is a highway to heaven and a stairway to hell, that only the worst of the worst will end up in hell and everyone else will somehow end up in heaven. Jesus seems to indicate the opposite, that the path to heaven is very narrow, it is hard, and only few will find it. Whereas the path to hell is wide, the way is easy and many people will end up there. We shouldn’t really get caught up in who will make it to heaven or how many, or how many people we think we need to be ahead of in order to make it. We need to worry about our own journey, our own path, and our own focus on the narrow path and the way that leads to eternal life.

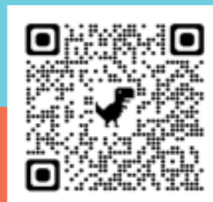

St. John's 12 Disciples Project

St. John's 12 Disciples Project

An unfortunate statement, true for many of us, is that personal, private, and meaningful prayer is rare in our lives, outside of the prayers of the regular Divine Liturgy.

Think ... why is this?

Think ... does it have to be this way?

Do each of us consider ourselves fully engaged in a daily prayer discipline?

The obvious answer is no to all these questions.

One of the simplest tasks we could undertake, personal prayer, requires hardly any effort or special resources. Several years ago, St. John's community instituted a Project intended to help us to strive toward developing a regular, personal, private, and meaningful prayer discipline. This guidance is called the 12 Disciples Project. This has been very successful with many members of our congregation, daily praying "for, "the peace from above, and for the salvation of our souls..." intended for each of you and directed to God for the benefit of hundreds of members of our congregation.

Participating "Disciples" receive a prayer and a short list of names, distributed monthly. Each participant receives a few names, so that all members of the Project collectively pray for each member of the St. John's Congregation. Combined, each member of our Congregation is prayed for daily by no fewer than 6 other members of the 12 Disciples Project! There is power in prayer and there is much power in collective, combined, directed, and daily prayer.
